Misrata is also a place rich in relationships, generous hospitality, and the world's oldest luxury carpets. It is a beautiful, coastal city that is welcoming, warm, and generous. Relationships are the foundational web of this city, and they are large. The first question a Misratan will ask another when they meet is, "What is your family name?" But even an honorable outsider can be warmly embraced by a family network.

Misrata is centrally located on the northern coast, and is a center of influence over politics and industry. As an outwardly religious city, men and women live segregated lives. Women in the streets are all covered in dark colored <abayes> which keep their modesty. Even in the home, men and women socialize in separate rooms except in very close relationships.

Misrata, like other Libyan cities, has much to rebuild. Jennifer Rose Ratka (UNPIO) aptly describes the crippling effects of conflict on this once wealthy country and the resulting dichotomies, "The beauty of its people versus the cruelty of the conflict. Libya's wealth of resources versus unaffordable essentials such as food and medicine. Insecurity forcing people to flee from their homes versus migrants and refugees continuing to come in, many hoping to cross the Mediterranean Sea to find a better future."



A Fragile Unity

The 2011 popular overthrow of the 42-year regime of Gaddafi achieved its aims, but at a high price. Unity eroded into chaos as regional factions turned against each other, vying for power. After a decade of civil war, weary Libyans look with measured hope to a recent "permanent" ceasefire agreement. Geneva hosted 75 regional and tribal leaders in early 2021 to agree on an interim Prime Minister and a threemember Presidential council. These recent enemies must forget the past to secure a future for their people. They must resolve questions of how to deal with corruption, allocate economic re-sources, disarm militias, and prepare the country for successful and safe elections in December. Urgent needs are to restore the production and export of oil and to evict foreign fighters. Pray for peaceful leaders with sincere desires to bring peace.
